
I've been heartened by the turn out at the various training days PAQ has been running around SE Queensland since April. There have been a number of Presidents' Days, Treasurers' Days and Secretaries' Days in Brisbane as well as the Gold Coast and to be run on the Sunshine Coast and Darling Downs in the next month or so.

Planning for these days has drawn upon the various surveys PAQ has carried out with different groups in 2019 & 2020. PAQ is planning to take these training days to other parts of Queensland in 2022 and is also looking at other initiatives for distributing the information to remote clubs. In its planning, PAQ has chosen to run these where there is a 5th weekday in a month so to not intrude on club meetings and outings.

However, this has some limitations as often it means that the training has to be spread thinly over the year. PAQ is looking at the other weeks in the months to find when few clubs meet in an area to see if we can increase the frequency of these training days.

PAQ has also been developing a new range of promotional materials for clubs to use in promoting themselves in their communities.

There is a series of 5 posters which can be personalized with Club Name, phone number and email contact details. Along with these is a series of



banners which again can be personalized with Club Name, phone and email contact details. We have also developed a series of business card designs which will carry the Club Name, meeting times and meeting place details as well as space for members to write their contact details on and then hand to a prospective member.

Detailed information about these will be sent within the next few weeks in time for clubs to prepare promotional activities for October and Probus Day.

PAQ, like all of its clubs, will be looking for Probus club members to volunteer for the PAQ Management Committee in 2022. We have many talented, experienced and capable Probus members in our SE Queensland clubs. Many of whom would like the opportunity to contribute to the growth and development of Probus in Queensland.

Please give it thought – PAQ is your club's association. Personally, I will have served 7 years on the committee at the next AGM and will be retiring. PAQ will need a new President, and other committee members, at the next AGM – will you step up?

Our Regional Report

The first meeting of the Group after coming out of COVID was held on Thursday 17 June 2021. There was a good attendance by most of the twenty Clubs in the Group which contributed to a good productive meeting.

Clubs were anticipating a report from the Presidents and Secretaries days. They were encouraged to have their Clubs represented at the Treasurers and Activities days.

We were informed that a Bowls Day has been arranged and that details would soon be circulated.

There was some discussion on Probus Day on 1 October. Separate events were planned for the ten Clubs on the north side of the river and the ten Clubs on the south side.

John Barclay, RLO Coordinator, reported that Lindy Morrison from Indooroopilly PC had accepted the role of RLO for the ten Clubs north of the river. There is another Probian interested in taking up the RLO role

for the ten Clubs on the south side.

We spent time considering joint activities involving more than one Club. There are arrangements that have been in place for some time and work well, but most Clubs are content to undertake their own activities.

Club contacts, Newsletter Editors and Activities Coordinators are shared within the Region.

PSPL Deputy Chair, Judith Maestracci reported that PSPL had almost completed negotiations with Alliance for a new Travel Insurance scheme. This will be of interest for Club members planning future travel.

Common problems for most Clubs were shared, such as ageing members, targeted recruitment and providing training and mentoring for Committee positions. It was considered necessary to have backup for important positions; such as the formation of a Sub-Committee for Activities. Some Clubs have good arrangements in place.

There was generally a positive response from Clubs using the EFT-POS machine. One Club receives one payment each year for annual subscriptions and monthly fees, and this

has led to increased attendance at monthly meetings.

The general feeling was that it was important to maintain a next-of-kin list – something that could fall into the list of responsibilities for the Membership Officer. The main suggestion was that this list could be held on the mobile phones of Activities Coordinators for each activity on the understanding that it was to remain confidential.


PAQ Mission Statement


Stop 1:

Probus Capalaba was proudly sponsored by the Rotary Club of Capalaba who donated \$500.00 to assist in getting the club up and running. Past



We certainly do not stint on Fun, Fellowship and Friendship.





WATTLE DAY

Celebrate Australia's National Wattle Day on 1 September

The first celebration of Wattle Day, in more than one State, on the same day, took place on 1 September in 1910 in New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia.

Subsequently, following the outbreak of the First World War in 1914, there came the desire among the public to sell wattle sprigs to raise money for the troops overseas and, later, for maimed soldiers and Women and Children's Charities, the date was changed to 1 August in NSW and other dates elsewhere to coincide with the best flowering of their local wattles to July in Queensland and to late September in South Australia.

In 1992, as a unifying gesture for this particular celebration, the first day of Spring, traditionally recognized as occurring on 1 September, was proclaimed by the Governor-General, Sir Ninian Stephen, to be Australia's National Wattle Day for everyone across Australia to celebrate at the same time. This has yet to be celebrated as a National Holiday.

Wattles have long had special meanings for Australians and, in 1988, the Golden Wattle (Acacia pycnantha) was officially gazetted as Australia's National Floral Emblem. There is certainly an intriguing tie-in with Probus, sharing,

Seven off-beat lessons learnt from a successful grant application

Recently Club was awarded a \$1,000 grant for Membership Promotion. The award was from Stockland Corp. Ltd., a Development Company with assets in shopping centres, housing and industrial developments and retirement villages.

Our concern had been, not so much the need to meet the criteria, but that all previous awards were for tangible items such as sporting goods and computers. In comparison with this, Marketing for Membership Promotion sounded a bit nebulous.

We went for it anyway, because that is what we needed the money for, and if you don't ask, you don't get. (Lesson No.1). We were grateful that Stockland recognised it as a legitimate need and expense, despite it being more ethereal.

As with all large organisations such as Stockland, they wish to promote their corporate citizenship, so, when searching for grants, don't just stick to the well-known and common grant givers.

Even banks give philanthropic grants!.

In the case of Stockland, the criteria for the Award covered Health and Well-being, Education, Community Connection, Biodiversity, Waste and materials, Carbon and Energy and Water Management and Quality. Naturally, as the HPC Probus Club we couldn't qualify for the lot, but we could for the first three on the list. Nowhere did it say that all the criteria had to be met and we could meet three of the seven. (Lesson No. 3 – Some don't need all criteria to be met)

We tackled the first with a bit of research on the effects of loneliness and isolation, and the benefits of "Fun, Fellowship and Friendship" for Seniors. "Education" was covered with the guest speakers and activities such as visits to museums, the State Library, Galleries and the like. "Community Connection" was addressed through joint activities with other Probus Clubs, and, for example, having the Men's Shed Band entertain us. We also mentioned that four of our members live in a Stockland Village. (Lesson No 4 – tie the application to the interest of the Grant Organisation if you can).

All Web Sites on how to apply for grants tell you to read the Grant Doc-

ument carefully. At first glance, we were almost put off by the daunting task of how to fill it in, when answers to each of several questions required 1000-2000 words (a 6-7K word application for just \$1000?) But no! It was between 1000 and 2000 characters for each question! Easy. (Lesson No. 5 – take note of the small print!).

We devised a Marketing Plan valued at about \$1,000, involving many of our members, and emphasized that the benefits would be ongoing for those who joined as a result. Also required were a description of how we will publicize the grant - this article being one way - and how we would help Stockland share the story. Unlike Charitable Grants, Corporations, such as Stockland, will always require their grant to be acknowledged in public in as many ways as possible. (Lesson No. 6).

Finally, while the wheels of Probus move slowly, those of Private Corporations can be faster. We applied in February, (fingers out - three weeks to apply) received word of our Award late in May, and have to submit a report of our actions and results within three months. So, we have to work fast to meet our undertakings (Lesson No. 7), but no financial acquittal is required.






