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HIGHLIGHTS

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MACGREGOR

The QMIR Berghofer Research Centre, Herston

The 1940's was a period of quandary for Australian, as it became so obvious they were facing the dilemma as to whether it should populate or suffer the consequences of never becoming a world force. Australian started to accept migrants from post-war torn Europe.

At that time, even though Australia had good medical research being conducted, migrants who came to Queensland left finding it was too difficult to live here. Queensland's climate is not replicated anywhere in the world and it had, at that time, all the problems associated with Dengue fever, Ross River, Q fever, Cane fever, Malaria and even Polio.

A group of scientists approached the State Government saying they felt they felt capable of making an impact and that they were able to raise the necessary funding for their work

All they would require was a suitable building. The government agreed and that is the way the work proceeds today with the Government still supporting the building and necessary administration. Every cent gained through donations goes to research. The government provided an old US Army hut, left over from WWII, unlined, unfinished, and full of asbestos. It proved to be a good start. One of the early and important discovery in the 1950s was the discovery that Salmonella that had posed an ever-present threat at the time was spread by cockroaches.

If we move on to the 2000's, we find that three new buildings have been constructed over time. One is a sixtyfour bed trial facility, with the others being fully devoted to research. There is also a car park.

The dedicated team of over a thousand scientists, staff and students research hundreds of diseases and conditions within the areas of Cancer Research, Mental Health and Neuroscience, Infection and Inflammation, and Population Health, in more than sixty specialised laboratories. Laser technology, capable of giving information quickly pulling lots of data on various diseases, has been found an invaluable tool. Constantly, discoveries, that are proving game-changers in relation to cancer, melanomas, dementia, heart diseases, with the latest one, asthma, are being made.

Typical of such is Treatment A2 - a study of hookworms. It was found that these pests have something that helps digest gluten. To manage this, the responsible scientists sought people who had high anaphylactic responses to gluten. These people were given hookworms and after a week, they gave them a speck of pasta.

The subjects were terrified. The centre had people standing by. There is a protein in the hookworm which it secretes when it takes in blood. At the end of that experiment nine out of the ten "guinea-pigs" refused to give their worms back. They were able to eat gluten. Without further ado, the scientists went to work in that field. They have a related protein they feel holds much promise.

What started in a dilapidated Army hut seventy years ago is rendering Queensland and Australia a place in the lofty echelons of the world's field of medical research.

Guest Speaker, Carwyn Arnold, President of Probus Association Queensland, provided a comprehensive overview of Probus in Australia and Probus Global.

Thanks to a Probus Month Grant from Probus Association Queensland, the Club purchased Probus bags and presentation folders, and convention name card holders. This enabled professional looking information packs to be put together which included a welcome letter from the President, Probus leaflets and a special newsletter edition outlining what the club does. This was all presented in a Probus folder inside a Probus bag. Each visitor was also given a Visitor Name Badge which made them feel part of the group.

Attendees were entertained by members of the U3A Ukelele Group and a special 40th anniversary cake was cut by Carwyn Arnold, PAQ President, 3 new members who were

Guest Speaker – Steve Titmus & Club Activities

Our September Guest Speaker was Steve Titmus, father of Olympic Gold Medal Winner Ariane. Steve and family had just returned from the Paris Olympics and began his presentation with films clips of Ariane's swimming events including winning gold for the 400 metres freestyle, 200 metres relay; and silver for 800 metres. "The atmosphere in the 20,000 seat stadium was electric, and the build up to the winning 400 metres was enormous, a world awaited event."

The shallow 1.6 metre deep pool (not 2 metres) with underwater wash prohibited world records except champion French swimmer. The ability to get 20,000 spectators into the arena in a short time was impressive, partly due to 200 ushers of the 800 ushers for the games.

To unwind at 11.00pm each night they adjoined to Irish Pub across the road. The story of the POD (Parents of Dolphins) jacket worn by parents of gold medal swimmers was interesting. There was a system to prevent accomodation, restaurants and cafes charging above normal prices, a 75,000 euro fine and shut down if caught. Exception was the highend 2,500 euro per night accomodation increased to 7,500 euros. Steve didn't benefit as they booked 12 months ahead at 1,000 euros per night with the rule coming out 6 months later – probably then 350 euros per night.

Steve gave us his thoughts on the venues that should be built for Queensland 2032 Olympics which should be built with future use in mind.

As part of our Probus month celebrations, members enjoyed lunch celebrating "The King's Birthday" at Buranda TAFE College. We 'dressed up' for the occasion honouring the red, white and blue for England. Alison Newcomb provided a lovely bottle of prosecco as a prize for the best hat and judged 'yours truly' the winner. 




For the next two hours, we were told the Australian Outback Story of drought, floods and family life and the many struggles particularly that of drought, that farmers have to live with.

GYMPIE Chance of a Lifetime -Highway Bypass Walk

In the early days of our great country, towns sprung up, usually near some useful feature. Often it was a river where the settlers could get water. In the case of Gympie, it was a gold rush and planning was a little haphazard, or non-existent, and the town sprung up in Nash Gully, quite near the Mary River. The town with its saddlers, butchers, pick and shovel suppliers and pubs established along the gully, and this became the main street. The road north to Maryborough and eventually south to Brisbane, led travellers, logically, right into the main street.

This road became the main road from the capital to the north and all traffic came through what we now call Mary Street. Down the hill from either direction, and up and away. This worked, but as time went by was not ideal, so the main roar, now called Bruce Highway was built just a few streets away and over time was adorned with lots of sets of traffic lights and of course service stations.

This arrangement worked quite well for a while, but as traffic volumes increased, it became obvious that a new road was required. It is a simple concept. However, in practice, there are many steps and a great deal of hurdles. First, we have to agree that the need is there, decide which route, or which side of town to put the road, political and financial considerations,

The audience had a great time laughing with, and sometimes at, the entertainers and we saw lots of happy smiling faces.


This concert is held every two years, so we are all looking forward to the next one.

REDCLIFFE CITY MIXED COMBINED WATAWIEH YORLYE -Hello, how are you?

Two hours flying time east, and an hour ahead, but with close to 800 years of history – Norf'k Ailen hosted us for a week. The language is a mix of Bounty (Old English) and Tahitian developed by Pitcairn Islanders who brought it with them when Queen Victoria granted them Norfolk. Early history of the island is unclear, but it was populated by Polynesians – reason for their departure unknown.

The military and penal settlements followed – evidenced by gracious buildings in Quality Row, Kingston and the forbidding ruins of the jail all built of local stone. Life was exceptionally harsh for prisoners: no fresh food, 12 hr days of hard labour and overcrowded cells. The majority of them finished up in a canvas bag with a wooden cross and the sand dunes taking over their burial places. Some headstones in Kingston Cemetery tell the story of soldiers slaughtered in revolts and infants dying a few days old.

Nowadays, on the island burials are free, a bus could be named after you and 100 pine trees are planted when a 100th birthday is celebrated. Also, on the plus side, no snakes, spiders and no fresh water. With a speed limit of 50kph or lower there is little need for traffic lights but cars give way to everything else on the road especially cows that graze on the verge. Watch out for the ones with tape on their tails. No street lights either – all part of being a Gold Level Dark Sky site to avoid distracting many varieties of migrating and nesting birds, particularly Green Parrots and Booboks, which can also be threatened by feral cats and chickens. Just as there is no public transport, children get their motor bike licence at 15, and there are few street numbers – identification is often by description – red roof or "leeke roof."

Most things are imported on the island, air freight is costly and a supply ship only lays off shore every 27 days to be unloaded by lighter. The island endeavours to be self-sufficient with home grown meat and vegetables, great fishing and the adoption of dry ice production techniques, Tesla storage batteries and a desalination plant. The island still struggles to maintain its political independence, buying education and health packages from Queensland and fuel from Fiji, but with no local council administration the Commonwealth appoints an administrator and a federal representative based in the ACT the local push for levels of independence is still strong as evidenced by NIPD - Norfolk Island People for Democracy.

We shared meals with "commandants", "convicts" and residents, as well as a special pyjama-clad 5 am breakfast of croissant and champagne to watch the opening of the Olympic Games. We also shared shopping experiences, walks, reading glasses and viruses while also solving a murder mystery.

Guest Speaker – Atiah Bell on Recycling

Thank you so much for having me at your meeting today. I have included the link to the Material Recovery Facility videos below. If you could please share these with your group members it would be greatly appreciated

Some of the questions asked by members are also answered below:

Q. How are fires within the landfill controlled?

A. Fires on the surface of the landfill are controlled by the compactor running over the flames. This method puts the fire out quite quickly. However, if the fire becomes large, there are always water supplies on site.

Fires within the landfill cell (under the pile) won't happen as there is no oxygen within the landfill pile. The air is pushed out with the compactor as the waste is added to the cell.

Q. What happens to the material once it's gone through the Material Recovery Facility?



Recycled Products

A. The bales of sorted material are sold to individual manufacturers. Within these different factories the glass, steel and aluminium are melted, the paper is pulped and the plastic is shredded or made into pellets.

The products are then turned into new items. Examples pictured below:


Thanks must go to Linda for organising the outing and making sure we understood the timetables to avoid missing the transport services – there's quite a long delay in the early afternoon.
